

Many of these can be used as self-directed photography assignments to help you learn the subject in greater detail. Each one has a paragraph or two giving you insight into the thought processes behind the artist's work, mostly in their own words. This alone guarantees that this book will be a source of inspiration for many years. This book would function brilliantly as a textbook. It contains far more information than could possibly be covered in any class. Besides jump-starting your personal creativity, it also covers art history, safety, environmental issues with the materials used, as well as archival information and getting your work out into the world. The truly amazing thing about this book is that even within the scope of the technical information presented, it never fails to keep its true focus on making art. A book that reduces photography to pushing a few buttons won't change your life â Â" this book, on the other hand, probably will.

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
