


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Rick Sammon's Evolution Of An Image: A Behind-the-Scenes Look At The Creative Photographic Process

I often complain that many photography instructional books, whether dealing with the capture phase or the post-processing phase, give you instructions without providing enough examples for the reader to easily understand the process. \hat{A} ¢ \hat{A} \hat{A} ceEvolution of an Image \hat{A} ¢ \hat{A} \hat{A} * is the book that provides the needed examples. After a quick introduction that lays out some general principles, the author provides a number of different photographs in their final form organized by genres like wildlife, people, seascapes, landscapes, scenic and action. Each photograph is then followed by a short summary of what Sammon \hat{A} ¢ \hat{A} \hat{A} TMs goal and thought process was in capturing the image. There is a short behind the scenes story, tips on what went into making the particular image, the post-processing techniques that were used to bring the image into more conformity with the photographer \hat{A} ¢ \hat{A} \hat{A} TMs goals, outtakes of the images that he didn \hat{A} ¢ \hat{A} \hat{A} TMt use, often with an explanation of why he didn \hat{A} ¢ \hat{A} \hat{A} TMt use the outtakes, and a final word of wisdom. There is a brief part on using Photoshop adjustment layers and smart objects. There is nothing new in this approach. Ansel Adams used almost the same approach in his great book \hat{A} ¢ \hat{A} \hat{A} ceExamples: The Making of 40 Photographs \hat{A} ¢ \hat{A} \hat{A} *, except these images were made with digital cameras and modern post processing. At first it might seem like this is a tip book, but many of the same ideas

keep coming up over and over, in different genres, whether it is that getting one good shot in a session is enough, or that one can reduce the exposure and highlights in post processing to reveal more detail in the highlight areas. While Sammons explains why he selected a particular set of exposure setting for an image, he rarely goes into great detail on the Lightroom adjustments, preferring to mention the principle and goal behind the adjustments. (In fact in the few cases where there were screen shots, the small size of the software adjustment panels was almost impossible to read.) Several of these photographs have appeared in his earlier books, but they bear reshowing here in light of his explanation of the processes he used to reach the final result. This is not quite a beginnerâ Â™s book. To get the most from the explanations it pays for one to already understand camera processes like exposure and focusing and post-production software like Lightroom. Instead this is an opportunity for folks who have gotten past those introductory stages to learn how to put that knowledge together to construct an image. I have to mention the authorâ Â™s easy-going writing style and enthusiasm. He regularly tells the reader to follow his heart and have fun. For what itâ ÂTMs worth, the author is wrong about the inability of Nikon cameras to create in-camera HDR. This facility exists on both my three year old Nikon D800 and my newer D500, and I expect may exist on a few earlier models as well. (I never really used the facility, much preferring the control of after-processing several exposures of the same image.) Hereâ ÂTMs a book that follows in a long, if not deep, tradition of explaining what goes into the creation of an image from first conception to final image. Note: The publisher provided me with a review copy of this book at no charge.

Rick is one of the finest photographer I know of. Reading his books has always been a privilege. I loved each every chapter in this new thirty seventh book. The Sammonisms, the steps from raw image to final image, the unexpected shots and even the outtakes, can't be explained any better. And as Jeff says in the beginning, Rick is no doubt a Magician. Special shout to the Wildlife chapters from Masai Mara and the landscapes/Seascapes from Iceland. Right timing for my Iceland trip next month. Thanks Rick for continuing to teach us as always.

Although many books cover exposure and camera settings for image capture, Rick does a great job of discussing why one would choose certain settings and composition.

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
