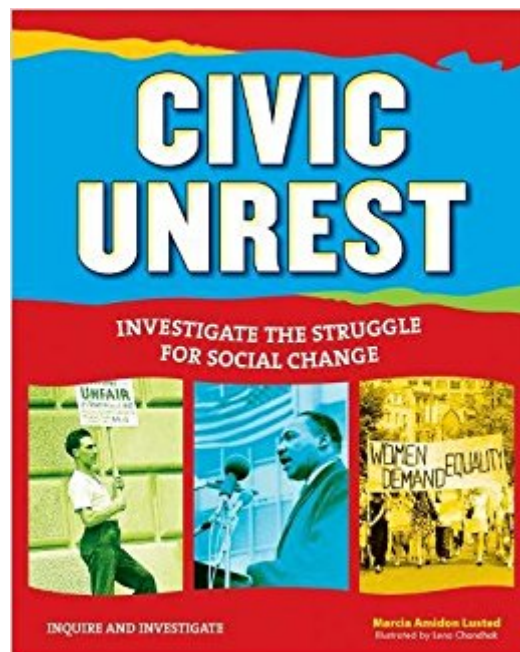


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# Civic Unrest: Investigate The Struggle For Social Change (Inquire And Investigate)
