One of the most popular writers of fantasy today, Terry Goodkind divides his time between Maine and Nevada.

Terry Goodkind WAS one of my favorite fantasy fiction authors. I have read most if not all the other books in this series prior to *Severed Souls*, but I'm closing the covers of this one at page 51. I didn't sign up to read a piece of horror fiction masquerading as fantasy. Sorry, Terry. Whoever persuaded you to keep writing Richard Rahl stories was not your friend.

Over explanation of events and very unrealistic dialog. Characters spend entirely too much time debating one another points of why something should be done a certain way. Mr. Goodkind's original writing style changed with *Naked Empire* when he decided to begin treating us to his political views and pouring them on us like molasses. I still enjoy the world of Richard and Kahlan, but it gets harder and harder with each new book to continue to follow them.

I love the sword of truth series and while I was very tempted to stop there and let Kahlan and Richard have their happy ending I wanted to know the rest of the story. I havr not been disappointed, disheartened but not disappointed, while using a slightly different "voice" from the sword of truth series the Richard and Kahlan books while slow to start are shaping up to be just as enthralling as the rest of the series. Terry Goodkind is not a great writer but he is an amazing story teller, you get washed away by the story and easily forget that they aren't perfectly written.

(minor spoilers maybe)I want to like this books. I really do, but it is becoming harder and harder with each one forthcoming. The original SOT had some sort of purpose it seemed and the Wizard's Rules gave each book a theme to learn and expand on, but since *Confessor*, which was my least favorite of the SOT, it really has been all downhill. I will read the final book when it comes out, just to finish it, but i also thought *Confessor* was going to be the final book... Calling it Richard and Kahlan instead of SOT does not make it different. To this book specifically... "Occult. Occult. Occult." I have never seen this word used with such regularity. I would not imagine that a book about the occult would use the word this much. I also find it supremely odd that everyone in the story, good, bad, indifferent, all call these abilities "occult." It would be like a cult leader calling themselves a cult-leader for the person using the abilities to call them occult all the time. If it were a drinking game, i would have been drunk 10 pages in and would have remained that way until i stumbled

through the last page. Also, I kept expecting Dagny Taggart to show up at any moment and join Zedd in the forest to tell Richard to leave it all behind. There were passages that could have almost been taken word for word from John Galt's radio speech. As mentioned by others, Richard as the Seeker of Truth is almost unbelievable anymore as he regularly finds himself not doing what he keeps saying he is doing (thinking of the solution, not the problem) and painted into a corner that he cannot possibly get out of without breaking rules of the underworld or reality over and over again with no real explanation as to why he can do this where no one else in the history of the world has been able to. Also, I know this has been mentioned as well, but the repetition has always been Terry's biggest weakness IMHO. Ringing of steel, thunder without sound, full histories in every book, as if anyone is picking up their first Goodkind book at book 14 of a series... Of course without all the repetition, this may be a novella and also then how would I ever know that rage makes the sword work or that Richard loves Kahlan if he didn't keep remembering times they were together in other books? Though I did say this had some twists, they were not really unexpected twists except for one particular death that probably should not have happened either except the character apparently forgot how to deal with people not affected by magic. Overall, this is exactly what I have come to expect sadly from this once-great series, though if I had been comparing it to *The First Confessor*, I would have given this one 5 Stars...

I felt obligated to read this series entry after reading the first 13 books in this series but if this one were the first book of the series, I would have put it down about half way through and swore off Terry Goodkind forever. A poor effort. It takes a lot for me to give a book this bad a rating but Terry Goodkind has gotten lazy. He rehashes the same concerns and history dozens of times. If all the redundancy was removed this book wouldn't be 100 pages of original material. Will I read #14, probably but like I said after reading so many books in this series, hesitate to call all of them novels, I will read the last. If not the last it'll be my last for this writer. Just a note, 'The Wheel of Time' series, which this one seems compared to the most, admittedly had some lapses with some of the middle books in the series I never considered stopping. Brandon Sanderson was a boon to that particular series.
