


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Expats In Ecuador: Life In Cuenca

Topics include: gringo prices, a reality check; the destiny of the U.S. dollar in Ecuador (where the dollar is the currency); why Cuenca means good health; what to expect from the local buses and taxis; how many more immigrants Cuenca can absorb; the profound cultural implications of crossing the street; such cultural conundrums as punctuality, efficiency, and honesty; challenges for couples; the day-to-day impact of the government; and much much more.Packed with personal experiences, the big-picture perspective, and inside info (for example, the one thing you can carry that will make life easy; how to buy a popular pill for men for ten cents on the dollar over the counter; and the one challenge that almost guarantees you wonâ ™t make it in Cuenca â " and itâ ™s not Spanish), Life in Cuenca will engage current expats in their own stories and inform prospective expats of exactly whatâ ™s to come.

Not only is practical living explored: shopping, dining, utilities, gas, condos, but also the cultural expectations of sharing another person's country. The authors give examples of interactions with the locals, what to do and not to do, as well as tips to negotiating currency. For me, this book read quicker than a great novel.

couple of years were concentrated on Cuenca. However, the more I read on Cuenca and researched other parts of the country I began to feel that for a longtime Florida guy that Cuenca is perhaps to cold for me along with the possible difficulties of the high altitude. In contrast to the euphoria or disenchantment of an expat "newbie", the author writes from the perspective of a number of years as a Cuencano resident. Many will find affirmation that Cuenca seems a perfect expat destination: moderate temperatures, low cost of living, healthier lifestyle. Others may be troubled by potential downsides: elevation, El Centro pollution, unpredictable weather or noise. Of course, few locations are perfect; what we see often depends on what we are looking for. Enough unbiased information is provided, however, to help the reader decide if Cuenca, is or isn't a possible "fit". Also helpful: the author provides links to an English language on-line publication, GringoTree, and other resources that afford an up-to-date "street" view of Cuenca based on the events and topics discussed. Altogether, a definite worthwhile read.

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
