


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Man Made: The Art Of Male Grooming

Dan Jones is a journalist, fashion editor, and style consultant working with the likes of ASOS, Topman, Time Out, and Condé Nast. This is Danâ [™]s second book.

Illustrations are fun, but as to style and grooming advice, doesn't offer anything new or different than the majority of sources that already exist.

I may be the wrong person to review this book since all my life I didnâ Â[™]t care for fashion or perfect grooming and had a job where you just had to be presentable. But I did admire people who had a certain rightness in their clothes, especially women. Since today we live in a society where for

many people the slob, no-style way of dressing is routine it would be nice if the pendulum swung the other way. But Jones throws in too much. He writes on diet, exercise, meditation. He even throws in a recipe for a green smoothie that is quite good. You won $\tilde{A} \notin \hat{A}^{TM}$ t be convinced to try a diet if you read a couple of graphs on it. This way youâ Â™II miss the best diet ever created: the 5-2, which Jones mentions. He pays too much attention to hygiene instead of dressing well. If you are interested in this book you will have basic hygiene under control and won't need guidance on shaving. . Bet you didnâ Â™t know the well-groomed man gets pedicures and if you visit London you can go to the worldâ Â[™]s best pedicurist and feel â Âœten years younger.â Â• If you want to smell nice Jones has two recommendations for you but a little bottle costs \$120 and \$230. Then there is a page titled â ÂœHow to pick the perfect pair of undies.â Â• In case youâ Â™re wondering if illustrated undies are okay, Garfield and the Simpsons are a no no but Peanuts is okay. Jones likes tattoos but there is no mention of the perfect nose ring. Maybe Jones wants it both ways, a book men will pick up for grooming and style tips and a book others will pick up for laughs. To his credit Jones urges you to create your own fashion. If you succeed you will show the world you have some artist in you and are a person who cares. When my date showed up nicely dressed and groomed it told me she respected herself and cared about my opinion.
