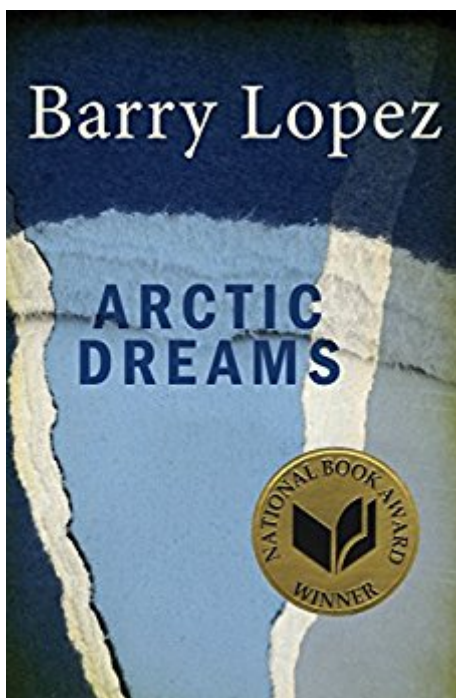


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Arctic Dreams

Barry Lopez has put together a fascinating and pleasurable journey of the arctic. If you've ever been drawn to stories of arctic exploration or what it means to live and survive in the arctic then this is the book for you. Lopez has cobbled together a combination of stories of arctic exploration from long ago with in depth studies of certain species that survive and thrive in the arctic to give a deeply moving and interesting sense of the entire region. Lopez is a fluid and engaging writer and he masterfully paints appealing pictures that move you through a region of our planet that is underappreciated and sometimes misunderstood by most. If any of what I've mentioned sounds even remotely interesting then please do not pass up this wonderful book.

People sometimes ask me "what is your favorite book?" Or "what is the best book you have ever read?". Since first reading this book in 1999 to the present (2015), having just finished reading "Arctic Dreams" for the 3rd time, I don't even hesitate to answer. Arctic Dreams is about the North, its people, its history, its biology, its geology, its exploitation, waters, animals, plants, ice, islands, the "north pole", and everything else "north" you might think of. It sucks you in. In the end, as you step back to gain some perspective, it is about you, and me, and life, and life on earth. Another reviewer noted Lopez brings the mind of a scientist together with the pen of a poet. I concur. And I feel privileged once again to have experienced this wonderful book.

I'm glad I bought the Kindle edition of this book. There are so many pithy and/or inspirational

passages in this book I've found my self going back and re-reading it a section at a time. The book is not just about the arctic, although of course it is. There are plenty of facts and historical tidbits relating to arctic climate, arctic people, arctic exploration. But at least as important is Mr Lopez's comments on the effects various cultures have on one another when they begin to blend, and the difficulties societies have trying to understand one another. I have to say, for whatever reason, it took me a couple chapters for this book to grab me. I almost quit reading it. Now I believe it is one of the more important books I've ever read.

I bought this and a slew of arctic book for my 90 year old mother who had just broken her arm. I live in the Arctic and wanted her to glimpse what life can be like here. She loved this book. She adores reading about Alaska. Barry Lopez is a consummate story teller that allows the reader to feel "first person" what he has experienced.

It is just an amazing achievement. Lopez is such a deep human being and his writing helps you understand the earth and where we fit in the universe. Just one example: When you think about polar bears, do you feel like weeping for their predicament? Maybe, but Lopez helped me understand that these creatures are soooo intelligent that they may well find their way out of this situation and it will almost certainly be without our help. We're perhaps not smart enough or compassionate enough to help them, but we can get a lot wiser if we just observe the cyclical comings and goings of the creatures with whom we share our world. And we can see God in that ebb and flow.
